Your Fair Share United Fund contribution works many wonders which Mr. and Mrs. Gregory Porter, Peace Corps Volunteers, didn't realize until disaster struck Rota, a small island in the Marianas. They wrote: "We live on an island populated by 1200 people. Usually we have no need for aid, but n November, 1967 Typhoon Guilda destroyed most of the nomes and crops here. There is an office of the Red Cross in Guam which services Guam and the entire of Micronesia. Navv and Red Cross were the first people here after the typhoon bringing medical needed supplies and knowledge of how to start rebuilding.
